Vicar's Report

These reports cover 2020, a year like no other! I did not begin as your Vicar until March 2021 so my notes here are much more forward looking than a retrospective on 2020. When the lockdown hit Sam was able to offer a great deal of online worship, which is still on the Facebook page – and offers an insight into this bit of history. When Sam and family left in August 2020 to serve the Church in Llandudno, the Church went into interregnum and was served by the Mission Area clergy for worship and duly cared for by the Wardens. There are no attendance figures included in this report as for a great deal of the year in person worship was either impossible or significantly reduced due to the pandemic.

I joined you mid-March 2021 and it's been an interesting couple of months! I am excited to be your vicar and to worship and work with you in the service of God. Having been licensed via Zoom on the 7th March, I have endeavoured to get to know you, and for you to get to know me – as best we can. I was overjoyed when we were able to gather for Sunday worship for the first time together on Good Shepherd Sunday. There is not much I can report really, other than to express my thanks for the welcome you have given me and admiration for how you cared for one another during lockdown.

Drawing on what I have heard from you about last year, and looking forward to the coming year I do want to note three things:

Endings and beginnings

You will note from the reports below that Lynn and Judi have come to the end of their term as Church Wardens. A heartfelt thanks to you both for you work and care as wardens over the last 8 years. You have held a lot and have led and cared for this church family through a VERY interesting 8 years!

At the time of writing we do not have any nominations for Church Warden. That is ok. Sometimes when folk have held a role well and for a while it becomes hard to see how anyone else could take on the role. Please do continue to pray, and to ask yourself if this is something God might be calling you to. It is a year-to-year commitment, with no one serving for more than 6 years in a row (unless there is unforeseen circumstances).

In this together

One of the metaphors for the church is that we are the Body of Christ. That means we belong together and are dependent on one another – but we are connected to one another through Christ, and together we are called to be Christ's body – the physical form of Jesus in our world today. Each of us has a part to play, and that comes out of who we are. Those of us who play an active and visible role in the life of the church do so with and as the whole church. So please do not worry if you are not called to a visible role, those who are encouragers, prayers, crafters, carers are vital to a healthy and vibrant church. If you are however called to a more visible role, server, reader, sides-person, warden – you can do so knowing that your offering is part of the offering of the whole church.

Money and Mission

We are not in a great place financially. We can either focus on this fact and get worn down by it. Or we can see it as an encouragement to grow our church and break down barriers within the communities we serve.

As we come out of lockdown I would really love to see the social committee rise to the occasion and find ways to welcome more and more people. If we focus on welcome first, and fund raising second, I believe we will grow. With growth, and nurturing faith, will come an increase in funds – to the glory of God!

We will take some time later this year to prayerfully think about our own giving in response to God's love. If you are not currently giving by gift direct and are able to, it is a significant help as they deal with the gift aid etc directly. Mission Area Conference 2020-2021

The Mission Area Conference has been able to meet throughout he pandemic, either face-to-face or on Zoom

In summer 2020 a survey of members was conducted to decide whether the Mission Area should continue to retain four stipendiary priests and all seven churches. This was particularly significant for All Saints (and Holy Trinity) because we had just lost our vicar, might not get another one, and faced a serious possibility of losing one of our churches. However the Conference voted unanimously to retain four priests and by a majority vote to keep all seven churches. This puts a heavy financial burden on the Mission Area and on each church, emphasising the importance of maintaining and expanding our mission activities and thus paying our way. A further consideration is the possibility of sharing more resources as a Mission Area. All these questions will be considered in the Mission Area Review which will be undertaken by the Diocese this summer.

Other important developments have been the setting up of the Church Army (Wrexham) Centre of Mission (formerly known as the Tin Can) and the start of the activities of the Resource Church (Hope Street) who have established a good relationship with the Mission Area. Rev Sarah Errington's community GroGarden project was launched on 1st May. The Conference feels that the pandemic has been blessed in that it has enabled us all, through online activity, to appreciate the worship and life of all the churches in the Mission Area.

Financial Report

Total money in accounts beginning of 2020: £34,772

Total income for 2020: £24,720

Total outgoings for 2020: £34,604

Total money in accounts end of 2020: £24,888

From a financial point of view, All Saints' has had a challenging few years, but we were never expecting to have a year like this!

Despite the closure of church, our congregation were committed to supporting the finances of All Saints' and were faithful in continuing their regular giving, either saving their envelope donations or even giving generous one-off donations, for which we are very grateful. The 'Gift Direct' scheme was an extremely important source of income throughout the lockdowns and provided a stable monthly income, in terms of both donations and the automated Gift Aid rebates. The Diocese is keen to promote such schemes and is also looking at alternative options for giving to the Church, particularly given that we are moving to an increasingly cashless society.

Functions and other fundraising efforts were typically a significant source of income in previous years. Clearly, due to the pandemic, such income has been extremely limited.

Expenditure was managed very closely again in 2020, with no non-essential spends. The Mission Area Share for 2020 was set at £32,943, although this was thankfully adjusted and reduced by £9,400, due to the closure of churches. The revised Share represented 68% of All Saints' expenditure. We were able to pay the reduced Share of £23,542 by the end of the year, although this was achieved by drawing £8,000 from the Income Bond account. £10,000 was similarly drawn from the NSI savings account in 2019 and the total reserves in savings accounts is now just £3,330.

The balance sheet shows the net assets of All Saints' Church as £24,888. Our net loss for 2020 was £9,884 (compared to a loss of £7,802 in 2019).


Once again, I would like to thank each and every member of our church family for their immeasurable contribution towards the financial security of All Saints'.


